Sudden Infant Death Syndrome Awareness Month



WHAT IS SUID?

Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID) is the death of an infant less than 1 year old that occurs suddenly and unexpectedly. The cause of death is not immediately obvious before investigation.

SUID includes all unexpected deaths: Those without a clear cause, such as SIDS, and those from a known cause, such as suffocation.

WHAT IS SIDS?

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) is the sudden death of an infant less than 1 year of age which remains unexplained after a thorough autopsy and case investigation.

CDC DATA

- Each year, around 3,400 infants in the U.S. die from SUID.
- SIDS affect some populations more than others. African American and Native American infants have higher rates of SIDS compared to white infants.



SAFE SLEEP TIPS

Reduce the risk of SIDS with these tips:

- Always place your baby on their backs to sleep.
- Place your baby on a firm mattress in a safety-approved crib, covered by a fitted sheet.
- Keep soft objects, toys, and loose bedding out of your baby's sleep area.
- Keep your baby's sleep area in the same room where you sleep for at least the first 6 months.
- Do not smoke or allow anyone to smoke around your baby.
- Dress your baby in sleep clothing, such as a wearable blanket, and keep the room at a comfortable temperature.
- Consider giving your baby a pacifier at naptime and bedtime.
