TRADITIONAL HEALTH CARE PRACTICES



- Behavioral Health Information Notice (<u>BHIN) 25-007</u> released in March 2025 outlines availability of a new DMC ODS benefit called <u>Traditional Health Care</u> <u>Practices</u>
- Intended to improve access to culturally responsive care, support ability to service patients, improve health outcomes and reduce disparities in access to care.
 - » Western mental health focuses on the individual as the locus of illness, while for AI/AN mental illness is just a symptom of a whole community that is suffering from its own history of oppression and violence.
- » Research shows that AI/AN who meet criteria for depression/anxiety or substance use disorder are significantly more likely to seek help from traditional/spiritual healers than from other sources.
- 723,225 Al/ANs live in California
- 55,302 Medi-Cal enrollees who selfidentify as Al/AN

TRADITIONAL HEALTH CARE PRACTICES



Traditional Health Care Practices

• Umbrella Term for services provided by Traditional Healer and Natural Helper

- Traditional Healer interventions include music therapy (e.g., traditional music and songs, dancing), spirituality (e.g., ceremonies, rituals, herbal remedies) and other integrative approaches
- Natural Helper include assisting w/navigational support, psychosocial skill building self-management and trauma support that restores health.
- Billable under DMC ODS when provided through Indian Health Care Providers (IHCPs).
- Eligible members include:
 - Enrolled in Medi-Cal or CHIP in Los Angeles County
 - Able to receive services from an IHCP

Traditional Health Care Practitioners

- Traditional Healer is a person who:
 - Currently recognized as spiritual leader with a Native American tribe, Nation, Band, or Native community
 - Has (2) years of experience practicing in a recognized setting that is contracted or employed by an Indian Health Care Providers.
 - Has knowledge, skills and practices based on beliefs and experiences accepted by the Indian community as handed down through the generations

• Natural Helper is a person who:

- A health advisor who seeks to deliver health, recovery, and social supports in context of Tribal culture
- Contracted or employed by Indian Health Care Provider
- Trusted member of a Native American Tribe, Nation, Band, or Native community
- Could be a spiritual leader, elected official paraprofessional or other individual.



Ensuring Access to Continuum of Treatment Services

- Participating IHCPs must provide, or coordinate with DMC-ODS counties to ensure access to, additional services to promote the treatment of substance use disorders (SUDs), including:
 - Comprehensive American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) assessments to identify other SUD treatment needs;
 - Medications for addiction treatment (MAT): services may be offered directly through the IHCP or there must be an effective MAT referral process in place; IHCP must implement and maintain a MAT policy; and
 - Other DMC-ODS services, as needed and desired by the member.

>Additional Information:

- Traditional Health Care services may only be provided through IHCPs
- LA County currently only has one IHCP United America Indian Involvement
- All services then are considered out-of-network
- This benefit is included in the Behavioral Health Member Handbook.

Provider Responsibilities:

- **Notify SAPC** when identify an eligible member requests Traditional Health Care services or when they receive the request from an IHCP.
- Follow out-of-network protocols outlined in the current Provider Manual.



If a county's provider network is unable to provide necessary and covered services to a beneficiary, the county must adequately and timely cover the services out-of-network for as long as the county is unable to provide them.

42 CFR Section 438.206

- An out-of-network provider is a provider that offers SUD treatment services but is not contracted with DPH SAPC.
- Medi-Cal members may be eligible to receive medically necessary DMC ODS services from out-of-network providers under certain circumstances.

Eligible Reasons for Out-of-Network (OON) Services

- 1. American Indians/Alaskan Natives wishing to receive services from an Indian Health Care Provider (IHCP) that is not SAPC network provider.
- 2. There are **no services within time/distance standards** OR there is no SAPC-contracted provider who offers a required DMC ODS service.
- 3. When a person transferring to LA County from another county requires a **transition in care** due to a specific conditions (e.g., risk of serious health, hospitalization, or institutionalization) requiring they retain their current provider (from the other county) for a period of time.
