Executive Summary

Introduction

The tenth Annual Review is a comprehensive descriptive report on the adult participants who received various types of treatment/recovery services from alcohol and drug programs contracted with the Los Angeles County Alcohol and Drug Program Administration (ADPA) during the 2005-06 Fiscal Year. Note that the majority of information and statistics presented in the Annual Review is based on participant admission and discharge information collected through ADPA's Los Angeles County Participant Reporting System (LACPRS). LACPRS is an ongoing, standardized, computer-supported system sustained by a close working relationship between ADPA and contracted alcohol and drug program providers.

The 2005-06 Annual Review is composed of the following five chapters:

- Chapter 1 provides statistical information on participants in ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). This includes program admission, participant demographic, primary drug problem, and treatment outcome statistics.
- Chapter 2 starts with a description of treatment services by division and program type. For each program type, a description of participants who were served in the 2005-06 Fiscal Year is provided along with key trend statistics that occurred over five fiscal years, 2001-02 to 2005-06.
- Chapter 3 provides admission, participant, and outcome trend statistics by special programs designed to serve the following special populations: criminal justice defendants, homeless individuals, needle users, persons with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems, pregnant and parenting women, and public assistance recipients.
- Chapter 4 provides participant-related demographic statistics for each of the 150 community-based agencies contracted with ADPA to provide alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services during the 2005-06 Fiscal Year.
- Chapter 5 is composed of numerous "Fact Sheets" which cover key Los Angeles County alcohol and drug-related indicators and outcomes.

ADPA-Funded Alcohol and Drug Treatment/Recovery Program Admissions

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, ADPA contracted with 150 community-based agencies that provided the following types of alcohol and drug treatment programs in Los Angeles County.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 150 ADPA contracted community-based agencies provided treatment/recovery services to a total of 44,853 participants who accounted for 56,016 program admissions

Table 2 shows the number of annual participants and program admissions from 2001-02 to 2005-06 fiscal years. Over the five fiscal years, the annual number of admissions to programs increased by 24.8% and the individual participants increased by 23.4%.

Treatment/Recovery admissions to programs increased by 24.8% over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06)

Participant Characteristics

Participant demographics have remained relatively constant over the five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, most of the treatment/recovery program participants were male (65.4%); Hispanic/Latino (34.2%), White (29.8%), or Black/African American (25.4%); between 25 and 44 years of age (57.5%); had 9 to 12 years of education (75.4%); and unemployed (68.4%). Methamphetamine (30.8%) was the most frequently reported primary drug problem followed by cocaine/crack (23.0%) and alcohol (19.7%). Over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), the number of participants reporting methamphetamine as their primary drug problem has increased each year.

Methamphetamine use has increased each fiscal year, 17.4% to 30.8% (2000-01 to 2005-06)

Participant Discharge Status

Participants with "Positive Compliance" are those who completed treatment or left before completing treatment with satisfactory progress. Over half of the program participants had positive treatment outcomes four out of five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). The five year-year average for positive treatment compliance was 52.3%.

Over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), an average of 52.3% of the participants received a positive treatment compliance assessment at program discharge. They successfully complied with their individualized treatment plans.

Treatment Services by Division and Program Type

Program participant characteristics were relatively similar across program types. Regardless of program type, the majority of participants were male, between 25 and 44 years of age, had 9 to 12 years of education, and were unemployed. Most participants were Hispanic/Latino, White, or Black/African American. The notable exceptions for the 2005-06 Fiscal Year were:

- Of the six program types, only day care programs provided services primarily to female participants (86.2%).
- Narcotic treatment programs served the largest proportion of older program
 participants. Among the narcotic treatment programs (detoxification and
 maintenance), over half of the participants were between 45 and 64 years of age,
 54.9% and 55.8%, respectively.

Narcotic Treatment Programs served the largest proportion of older adult participants, 45 to 64 years of age.

Treatment Services by Division and Program Type - Continued

Methamphetamine was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for three program types; day care (41.2%), outpatient counseling (33.1%), and residential services (36.5%). Over 90% of participants in narcotic treatment programs reported heroin as their primary drug problem. This is to be expected since by design narcotic treatment programs provide services to individuals addicted to heroin or other morphine-like drugs. Heroin (43.3%) also ranked as the number one drug problem for participants who received residential detoxification services.

Table 3 shows positive treatment compliance by program type for the 2005-06 Fiscal Year. Positive outcomes varied among program types. However, residential programs had higher percentages of positive compliance. The majority of participants in residential detoxification (79.3%), residential services (61.6%), and NTP detoxification (50.6%) complied with their treatment plans.

The majority of participants in residential detoxification (79.3%), residential services (61.6%), and NTP detoxification (50.6%) had positive treatment outcomes.

Special Populations

ADPA-contracted treatment/recovery programs address specific needs of certain populations such as criminal justice defendants, homeless individuals, needle users, persons with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems, pregnant and parenting women, and public assistance recipients.

Proposition 36 Defendants

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, the most frequently reported primary drug problem for CalWORKs recipients was methamphetamine. The prominence of methamphetamine has grown from 25.4% in 2001-02 to 45.5% in 2005-06.

Non-violent drug offenders

- The average percent of CalWORKs participants with positive treatment compliance each of the five fiscal years was 51.0%. More specifically, over five fiscal years, 3,213 of the 6,311 CalWORKs recipients discharged from alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs successfully complied with their treatment plans.
- Admissions for participants with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems more than doubled over five fiscal years; 5,632 in 2001-02 to 12,263 in 2005-06. Over five years, most program participants reported alcohol, cocaine/crack, or methamphetamine as their primary drug problem.
- Over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), the majority of drug court participants reported cocaine/crack or methamphetamine as their primary substance abuse problem. Each of the past five fiscal years, the majority (66.0% to 71.0%) of the drug court program participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status.
- During the five fiscal year time period, cocaine/crack remained the most prominent primary drug problem for female offenders despite the dropped from 70.7% in 2001-02 to 39.8% in 2005-06. During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 53.3% of the female offender participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status.

Special Populations - Continued

- Alcohol was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for general relief participants for the first four fiscal years (2001-02 to 2004-05). In 2005-06, methamphetamine became the number one drug problem for general relief recipients. Methamphetamine use has increased each fiscal year, from 15.0% in 2001-02 to 30.4% in 2005-06.
- A total of 49,950 homeless participants have been admitted to ADPA-funded alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs over the last five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). The percent of homeless participants reporting mental health concerns has increased slightly over the five-year period, from 15.0% in 2001-02 to 23.3% in 2005-06.
- ➤ In 2005-06, the most prominent drug problems reported by homeless participants were methamphetamine (30.7%), cocaine/crack (28.8%), and alcohol (19.0%). Each fiscal year, the majority (56.4% to 62.3%) of homeless participants successfully complied with their treatment plan.
- ➤ Each fiscal year, heroin was the primary drug problem for two-thirds of needle users. Noteworthy is the increase in needle users reporting methamphetamine as their primary drug problem, from 11.0% in 2001-02 to 19.2% in 2005-06.
- ➤ Over the five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), the majority (58.2% to 79.7%) of perinatal program participants received services from a day care program. Perinatal participants were most likely to report cocaine/crack or methamphetamine as their primary drug problem. While cocaine/crack (40.1% to 21.7%) has declined each fiscal year; methamphetamine (30.2% to 43.6%) use has increased.
- The number of pregnant women in alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs has increased by 29% (734 to 947) over the five fiscal years. During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 6.1% (947 of 15,534) of female participants reported being pregnant. Since 2002-03, methamphetamine has been the most frequently reported primary drug problem followed by cocaine/crack.
- ➤ In 2005-06, one-third of the PPN participants reported methamphetamine as their primary drug problem. Methamphetamine use doubled during the five year period (16.8% in 2001-02 to 34.7% in 2005-06).
- ➤ Since implementation in July 2001, Proposition 36 participants have increased from 3,550 in 2001-02 to 13,720 in 2005-06. Since 2002-03, methamphetamine ranked as the number one drug problem. Over the five fiscal years, approximately 4 out of 10 Proposition 36 participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status.

Introduction

The tenth Annual Review is a comprehensive description of adult participants who received alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services during the 2005-06 Fiscal Year. Adult treatment services are traditional ADPA-contracted residential and non-residential alcohol and drug treatment/recovery program services (day care, detoxification, outpatient, and residential) provided to individuals who are 18 years of age and older.

The 2005-06 Annual Review is composed of the following five chapters:

- Chapter 1 provides statistical information on participants in ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06).
- Chapter 2 provides a description of treatment services by division and program type. For each program type, a description of participants who were served in the 2005-06 Fiscal Year is provided along with key trend statistics that occurred over five fiscal years, 2001-02 to 2005-06.
- Chapter 3 provides admission, participant, and outcome trend statistics for special populations.
- Chapter 4 provides participant-related demographics for each of the 150 community-based agencies contracted with ADPA during the 2005-06 Fiscal Year.
- Chapter 5 is composed of numerous "Fact Sheets" which cover key Los Angeles County alcohol and drug-related indicators and outcomes.

The majority of the information found in the Annual Review is based on participant admission and discharge data collected through ADPA's Los Angeles County Participant Reporting System (LACPRS). LACPRS is an ongoing, standardized, computer-supported system sustained by a close working relationship between ADPA and contracted alcohol and drug program providers.

For the purposes of this report, participant and program admission are defined, as follows:

- (1) A <u>participant</u> is an individual who is admitted and becomes actively engaged in an alcohol or drug treatment program.
- (2) A program admission is a treatment event that starts when the program admits the participant.

The Annual Review includes all adult participants who received services in ADPA-contracted treatment/recovery programs. This review does not include information on participants who received substance abuse services at facilities operated by federal agencies in Los Angeles County (e.g., the Veterans Administration), crisis intervention facilities (e.g., hospital emergency departments), private entities, and other publicly funded non-ADPA contracted programs. The Annual Review does not include information on ADPA-contracted youth/adolescent and prevention programs.

■ Chapter 1 – LAC Alcohol and Drug Treatment Program

Introduction

Alcohol and Drug Program Administration (ADPA) contracted with community-based agencies to provide a range of treatment and recovery services to County residents with alcohol and other drug problems. Consistent with federal, State, and County reporting requirements, each time an individual enters or departs from a treatment program, standardized admission or discharge information is collected. Since a participant may be admitted to more than one program during a fiscal year, or return to the same program more than once, the number of participant program admissions can be greater than the number of individual participants.

LAC Program Admission and Participant Trends

Table 1.1 shows the number of annual participants and program admissions from 2001-02 to 2005-06 fiscal years. During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment programs provided services to a total of 44,853 participants who accounted for 56,016 treatment/recovery program admissions.

Over the first four fiscal years (2001-02 to 2004-05), the number of program admissions and participants increased by 31.4% and 30.8%, respectively. From the fourth to fifth fiscal year (2004-05 to 2005-06), there was a slight decline in both admissions (-4.9%) and participants (-5.6%). Overall, program admissions increased by 24.8% and individual participants increased by 23.4%.

LAC Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 1.2 shows the type of programs that provided alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services to participants over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). During the five-year period, most participants received services from an outpatient counseling program. More than half of the participants were admitted to an outpatient counseling program during the last two fiscal years (2004-05 and 2005-06). In the first fiscal year (2001-02), a third of the participants received services from a residential service program. For the remaining fourth fiscal years (2002-03 to 2005-06), approximately 1 out of every 4 admission was to a residential service program. Day care program admissions remained constant; the five-year average was 3.4%. Admissions to residential detoxification programs fluctuated slightly, ranging from a high of 11.1% in 2002-03 to a low of 8.0% in 2005-06. With the exception of 2003-04, there has been a downward trend in the percent of admissions (from 5.7% to 1.3%) to narcotic treatment detoxification programs. Over the five fiscal years, narcotic treatment maintenance programs accounted for approximately 4.0% to 6.0% of the admissions.

Chapter 1

LAC Program Participant Demographic Trends

Table 1.3 shows the demographics for program participants over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). Participant demographics have remained relatively constant during this period. The majority of participants were male (63.9% to 66.4%); between 25 and 44 years of age (57.2% to 63.6%); had 9 to 12 years of education (74.9% to 78.8%); and unemployed (68.4% to 85.1%). Most participants were Hispanic/Latino (33.7% to 36.1%), White (29.8% to 32.0%), or Black/African American (25.4% to 30.3%).

LAC Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

The primary drug problems reported by program participants over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06) are shown in Table 1.4. During the five fiscal years, approximately 1 out of 5 participants reported alcohol as their primary drug problem. Heroin use fluctuated annually during the five-year period, ranging from a high of 20.8% in 2001-02 to a low of 13.1% in 2005-06. From the first to the second fiscal year (2001-02 to 2002-03), cocaine/crack was the most frequently reported primary drug problem. In the third fiscal year (2003-04), both cocaine/crack and methamphetamine ranked as the most prominent primary drug problems reported by participants. Beginning with the fourth fiscal year (2004-05), methamphetamine surpassed cocaine/crack and became the most frequently reported participant primary drug problem.

One notable change in participant reported primary drug problems over these five fiscal years has been the steady increase in methamphetamine use; from 17.4% in 2001-02 to 30.8% in 2005-06. During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, the majority of methamphetamine users were White (37.3%) or Hispanic/Latino (45.4%). The average age for marijuana/hashish (31.3 years) and methamphetamine (31.8 years) users was considerably younger than the average age of other primary drug user groups. Methamphetamine users had the highest percent (38.9%) of female participants.

LAC Program Participant Discharge Status Trends

Table 1.5 shows treatment compliance over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). Participants with "Positive Compliance" are those who completed treatment or left before completing treatment with satisfactory progress. "Negative Compliance" refers to those participants who left before completing treatment with unsatisfactory progress. The majority of program participants had positive treatment outcomes four out of the five fiscal years. In 2003-04 Fiscal Year, slightly less than half (49.4%) of the participants had positive treatment outcomes. The five-year average for positive treatment compliance was 52.3%

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 52.9% of participants who departed from programs with a negative compliance assessment were in treatment for less than 31 days. This outcome is consistent with current literature which states that better or positive outcomes are associated with longer treatment durations.

Chapter 2 – LAC Alcohol and Drug Treatment Program by Division And Program Type

Introduction

Chapter 2 describes the participants in alcohol and drug treatment/recovery program by division and program type. During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 150 individual community-based agencies operated 362 treatment programs at 295 different facility sites located throughout Los Angeles County.


Alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs are classified as either non-residential or residential and as one of the following six program types:

Non-Residential – Participants reside outside of the program facility while receiving treatment/recovery services.

- <u>Day Care Programs</u> provide counseling and recovery services to persons who have drug and/or
 alcohol-related problems. The primary purpose of these services is to provide a planned treatment
 program in a social setting structured to maximize recovery and rehabilitation of participants. These
 programs services are more intensive than a visit (person-to-person contact) but less extensive than
 24-hour residential services. The services are usually available a minimum of six hours per day, six
 days per week.
- <u>Outpatient Counseling Programs</u> provide crisis intervention, counseling, and participant referral services
 to individuals affected by alcohol and/or drug-related problems. Services may include participant
 screening and assessment, development of treatment plans, individual and group counseling, hosting
 mutual self-help groups, coordination of services with other agencies, and referral to other resources.
 Outpatient counseling is designed to provide an alcohol and drug-free structured environment that
 encourages and supports a participant's effort to improve his/her level of functioning.
- Narcotic Treatment Detoxification Programs administer or furnish methadone and/or levo-alphaacetylmethadol (LAAM) in decreasing doses for a period not to exceed 21 days to assist an individuals' withdrawal from dependency on heroin or other morphine-like drugs. Services may include intake and physical examination, casework services, an individualized treatment plan, body fluid testing, coordination of additional services with other agencies, and referrals to other resources.
- Narcotic Treatment Maintenance Programs administer methadone/LAAM, at relatively stable dosage levels for a period in excess of 21 days, as an oral substitute narcotic drug. The treatment protocol is accompanied by ancillary social and medical services for individuals 18 years of age or older who have a history of two or more years of dependence on heroin or other morphine-like drugs and two or more failures in alternative treatment programs. Services may include intake and assessment, body fluid testing, group and family counseling, crisis intervention, coordinating additional services with other agencies, and participant follow-up.

Residential – Participants reside in a drug-free program facility, operating on a 24-hour per day basis, receiving food and shelter as part of the treatment/recovery service.

- Residential Detoxification Services provide care and treatment for person suffering from the withdrawal
 symptoms of alcohol and/or other drugs in a non-medical setting. These services are generally offered
 as preparation for entry into a treatment and recovery program, therefore, the medical and
 psychological supports are provided. Services may include physical examination and medical history,
 medication as needed, recidivism counseling, referrals to other resources, and after care planning.
- <u>Residential Services</u> is a 24-hour live-in, drug-free treatment environment for persons with drug and/or alcohol-related problems. Participants are involved in no less than six hours of planned treatment activities per day under the supervision of trained staff. Services may include intake and participant screening, room and meals, crisis intervention, individual and group counseling, host mutual self-help group discussions, and social and recreational activities.



Non-Residential Program Admission Trends

Table 2.1 shows admission trends over five fiscal years by the four non-residential program types and the overall non-residential program. The number of non-residential program admissions increased over the first four fiscal years, from a low of 25,651 admissions in the 2001-02 Fiscal Year to a high of 39,061 admissions in the 2004-05 Fiscal Year. Then in 2005-06, non-residential program admissions dropped to 36,294 (2,767 fewer). As shown, outpatient counseling programs account for the majority (71.9% to 86.1%) of non-residential admissions each fiscal year. From 2001-02 to 2004-05 fiscal years, outpatient counseling admissions increased by 65.2% and decreased by 1.5% in 2005-06.

Day care admissions increased 38.1% from the first to third fiscal year (2001-02 and 2003-04). From the third to the fifth fiscal year, day care program admissions deceased by 3.1% (1,971 to 1,909). Narcotic treatment detoxification program admissions were relatively constant the first two fiscal years (2,562 to 2,303). Then, in the third fiscal year, program admissions more than doubled to 5,216. Over the remaining two fiscal years, narcotic treatment detoxification admissions decreased by 70.2% (1,553) in 2004-05 and by another 54.5% (706) in 2005-06. The narcotic treatment maintenance program admissions have fluctuated over the five fiscal years, ranging from a low of 1,794 in 2002-03 to a high of 3,834 in 2004-05. Essentially the same number of narcotic treatment maintenance program admissions was reported in 2001-02 and 2005-06 fiscal years, 2,463 and 2,425, respectively.



Residential Program Admission Trends

Table 2.2 shows admission trends over five fiscal years by the two residential program types and the overall residential program. The admissions to the overall residential program decreased by 4.2% from 2001-02 to 2002-03. Conversely, over the next two fiscal years (2003-04 to 2004-05), reported residential program admissions increased by 8.1%. A decrease of less than 1.0% was seen in 2005-06 Fiscal Year. The residential services program, the larger of the two types of residential programs, had an 11.6% decrease in reported admissions from 2001-02 to 2002-03, followed by a steady increase over the remaining three fiscal years (2003-04 to 2005-06). There was a 27.2% increase in residential detoxification program admissions over the first three fiscal years (2001-02 to 2003-04). A downward trend occurred in the remaining two fiscal years (2004-05 to 2005-06), 6.0% and 12.7%, respectively.

Admissions by Division and Program Type

As shown in Table 2.3, a total of 56,016 admissions were reported during the 2005-06 Fiscal Year. Approximately two-thirds of participant admissions were to non-residential programs. The majority (86.1%) of non-residential participant admissions was to outpatient counseling programs. The remaining one-third of participant admissions was to residential programs with the majority (77.2%) of participants being admitted to residential services programs.



Table 2.5 shows that over the five fiscal years, the primary drug problem for most day care program participants was either methamphetamine or cocaine/crack. Since 2001-02 Fiscal Year, there has been a steady decreased in the percent of participants who reported cocaine/crack as their primary drug problem. Four out of 10 participants reported cocaine/crack as their primary drug problem in 2001-02 compared to 2 out 10 participants in 2005-06. During the five-year period (2001-02 to 2005-06), methamphetamine users increased from 19.6% to 41.2%. Over the last two fiscal years, 4 out of 10 participants reported methamphetamine as their primary drug problem.







According to Table 2.9 during the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 43.6% of the outpatient counseling program participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status; they were successful in complying with their treatment plan. 





Chapter 3 – LAC Alcohol and Drug Treatment Program Special Populations

California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids' Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Introduction

Under the federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, adults receiving cash assistance through Temporary Aid to Needy Families [(TANF), which replaced Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program] have an 18 to 24 month limit on aid, during which time they have to engage in a set number of hours of work or work-related activity. There is a five-year lifetime limit on aid as well. When California adopted TANF, the State Legislature voted to rename California's welfare reform program California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs). Under the CalWORKs program, counties may provide additional supportive services to participants including mental health, domestic violence, and substance abuse treatment. These services are designed to remove potential barriers for participants trying to obtain and retain employment.

Participants are pre-screened by Department of Public Social Services staff during CalWORKs intake to determine if there is a possible substance abuse problem. Participants identified with a possible alcohol or other drug problems are referred to ADPA-contracted Community Assessment Services Centers (CASC) for a clinical assessment.

Participants identified with alcohol or other drug problems by CASC are encouraged to participate in a treatment and recovery program. ADPA's network of alcohol and other drug treatment/recovery programs provide services for CalWORKs recipients. Participation in these supportive services is considered a part of the welfare-to-work plan. The time spent in substance abuse treatment and recovery services normally satisfies the participant's weekly program requirement for work or job training and related activities.

CalWORKs Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.1 shows that CalWORKs admissions declined by 19.4% from the first to second fiscal year (2001-02 to 2002-03). For the remaining three fiscal years (2003-04 to 2004-05), the number of admissions increased each year. The number of participants decreased and increased in a similar pattern as admissions.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 2,049 participants accounted for the 2,325 CalWORKs' admissions; 217 (10.6%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

CalWORKs Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.2 shows the type of programs that provided alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services to CalWORKs' participants over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). During this period, outpatient counseling programs had the highest percent of admissions for CalWORKs' participants. Approximately, 3 out of 10 CalWORKs' participants were admitted to residential services each fiscal year. The five-year average for admissions to day care programs was 18.1%.


CalWORKs Program Participant Demographic Trends

As shown in Table 3.3, the demographics for CalWORKs' participants remained relatively constant over five fiscal years. The majority of participants were female (74.0% to 85.7%), between 25 and 44 years of age (68.8% to 76.9%), completed 9 to 12 years of education (78.0% to 85.2%), and unemployed (74.2% to 95.0%). Most CalWORKs' participants were Black/African American (24.4% to 39.1%), Hispanic/Latino (34.2% to 40.2%), or White (23.0% to 25.2%). Over the first three fiscal years, 1 out of 5 CalWORKs participants reported being homeless at admission and 1 out of 4 were homeless in 2004-05 and 2005-06.

CalWORKs Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

According to Table 3.4, methamphetamine has been the most frequently reported primary drug problem for four out of five fiscal years. Methamphetamine prominence has grown annually from 25.4% in 2001-02 to 45.5% in 2005-06. In 2001-02, cocaine/crack (32.1%) ranked as the number one primary drug problem for CalWORKs participants. Then cocaine/crack use declined each of the remaining four fiscal years, from 27.9% (2002-03) to 16.6% (2005-06). The percentage of CalWORKs participants reporting alcohol as their primary problem decreased over the five fiscal years (20.2% to 15.6%). There was a slight increased (9.0% to 13.9%) in participants reporting marijuana use from 2001-02 to 2005-06.

CalWORKs Program Participant Discharge Status Trends

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 53.0% of the CalWORKs participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status; they were successful in complying with their treatment plan (Table 3.5). The five-year average for positive treatment compliance assessment was 51.0%.

Co-Occurring (Mental Illness and Substance Abuse) Disorder Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs


Introduction

Individuals with co-occurring disorders have mental illness and substance abuse problems. Based on a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) study (1997), it is estimated that on any given year, approximately 10 million people in the United States have a substance abuse problem and at least one other mental illness. The 2001 Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS) indicated that about 16.0% of all substance abuse admissions were for individuals with co-occurring disorders. This percentage is slightly lower for Los Angeles County. In Los Angeles County, 11.4% of the alcohol and drug admissions in 2001-02 Fiscal Year had chronic mental health problems or disabilities.

The following salient points regarding individuals with co-occurring disorders are based on national and local statistics:

Office of Applied Studies – The Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS) Report (April 9, 2004)

- In 2001, nationally, males accounted for 56.0% and females 44.0% of the admissions for individuals with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems. In Los Angeles County, for 2001-02 Fiscal Year, about the same percentages were reported for males (53.9%) and females (46.1%).
- The DASIS Report (2001) shows that nationally Whites (74.0%) constituted the majority of admissions identified for individuals with co-occurring disorders, followed by Blacks (15.0%) and Hispanic/Latinos (7.0%). In Los Angeles County, however, Whites comprised only 44.0% of participants with co-occurring disorders in 2001-02, 31.7% Blacks and 19.2% Hispanic/Latinos.
- Nationally (2001), alcohol was more likely to be the reported primary substance of abuse for admissions (45.0%) of individuals with co-occurring disorders. Opiates (21.0%), cocaine (11.0%), and marijuana (13.0%) were less likely to be the primary substances of abuse.
 - During the 2001-02 Fiscal Year, in Los Angeles County, participants reported similar percentages for alcohol (27.7%) and cocaine/crack (27.3%). During this same period, 19.2% reported heroin use. Methamphetamine (12.5%) and marijuana/hashish (6.7%) were less likely to be substances of abuse for participants identified with co-occurring disorders.
- In 2001, about 60.0% of national admissions for individuals with co-occurring disorders were to ambulatory/non-residential settings. Residential/rehabilitative settings accounted for 22.0% of the admissions and the remaining admissions were detoxification services (19.0%). In Los Angeles County, the majority (51.7%) of admissions for participants with co-occurring disorders were to a non-residential program, day care (6.2%), narcotic treatment detoxification and maintenance (6.4%), and outpatient counseling (39.1%). Over one-third (34.6%) of the admissions were to a residential services' program and 13.4% were for residential detoxification.



Co-Occurring (Mental Illness and Substance Abuse) Disorder Admissions and Participant Trends

For individuals with co-occurring disorders, there was a significant increase in the number of admissions and participants over five fiscal years (Table 3.6). The number of admissions and participants more than doubled in 2005-06 Fiscal Year compared to 2001-02 Fiscal Year.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, there were 10,395 participants which accounted for 12,263 admissions to alcohol and drug treatment programs; 1,471 (14.2%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

Co-Occurring (Mental Illness and Substance Abuse) Disorder Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.7 shows that over the five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06) the number of admissions to outpatient counseling programs increased each fiscal year. In 2005-06, the majority (57.4%) of participants with co-occurring disorders received services from an outpatient counseling program. Admissions to residential services declined from 34.6% in 2001-02 to 26.2% in 2005-06. Over the first three fiscal years (2001-02 to 2003-04), 13.7% to 15.3% of participants received services from a residential detoxification program. This percent dropped to 8.5% in 2005-06.



Table 3.8 shows that the demographics for participants with co-occurring disorders have remained stable over the five fiscal years (from 2001-02 to 2005-06). The majority of participants were male (53.9% to 56.4%), unemployed (72.7% to 94.9%), and reported between 9 to 12 years of education (70.5% to 75.8%). Most participants were White (39.5% to 44.0%), Black/African American (29.6% to 32.2%), or Hispanic/Latino (19.2% to 20.9%). The percent of participants with co-occurring disorders who reported being homeless decreased from 29.8% in 2001-02 to 23.1% in 2005-06.

Co-Occurring (Mental Illness and Substance Abuse) Disorder Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

Over the five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), participants with co-occurring disorders reported alcohol, cocaine/crack, and methamphetamine as their primary drug problems. Methamphetamine users increased each fiscal year; from 12.5% in 2001-02 to 21.3% in 2005-06. There were relatively constant patterns of abuse for alcohol (from 27.5% to 29.3%), cocaine/crack (from 24.3% to 27.3%), and marijuana (6.7% to 8.0%) during this five-year period. Heroin abuse was 19.2% among participants with co-occurring disorders in 2001-02 but declined to 12.4% in 2005-06.



Drug Court Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Introduction

Drug Court is a full or part-time court that has specifically been designated and staffed to supervise non-violent drug defendants who have been referred to a comprehensive and judicially monitored program of drug treatment and rehabilitation services. First established in Los Angeles in 1994, there are currently 13 operational adult Drug Court programs located throughout the County. The Drug Court Judge heads a non-adversarial team of court officers, defense and prosecution attorneys, and treatment counselors to support a participant's recovery through intensive supervision, drug treatment services, frequent drug testing, and court appearances.

The goals of drug court programs are to:

- reduce drug usage and recidivism;
- provide court supervised treatment; and
- offer the capability to integrate drug treatment with other rehabilitation services to promote longterm recovery and reduce social costs.

Drug Court Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.11 shows that from the first to the fourth fiscal year (2001-02 to 2004-05) the number of program admissions and participants decreased by 28.2% and 29.7%, respectively. In the fifth fiscal year (2005-06), both admissions and participants increased by 15.0%.

In 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 1,886 program participants accounted for 2,317 admissions; 360 (19.1%) of these participants had two or more admissions. Drug court admissions represent 4.1% (2,317 out of 56,016) of all admissions to County-funded alcohol and drug treatment programs.

Drug Court Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.12 indicates that the majority of drug court admissions (from 53.1% to 66.7%) were to outpatient counseling services. Admissions to residential services have fluctuated over the five fiscal years. However, one third of drug court participants were admitted to a residential service program in the both the first (2001-02) and fifth (2005-06) fiscal years.

Drug Court Program Participant Demographic Trends

Table 3.13 shows that over five fiscal years most drug court participants were male (71.6% to 73.1%); Hispanic/Latino (37.1% to 45.8%), Black/African-American (24.2% to 32.4%) or White (21.0% to 26.6%); between 25 and 44 years of age (61.7% to 66.7%); and unemployed (72.7% to 88.2%). During this five-year period, drug court participants who reported being homeless ranged from 13.1% in 2005-06 to 28.0% in 2003-04.

Table 3.14 shows that methamphetamine surpassed cocaine/crack and became the most frequently reported primary drug problem for drug court participants in 2005-06. Methamphetamine prominence has grown annually, doubling from 21.3% in 2000-01 to 42.6% in 2005-06. Over the five fiscal years, slight declines were seen for drug court participants reporting alcohol and heroin as their primary drug problems. During this same period, marijuana/hashish use remained fairly constant.



Female Offender Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Introduction

This project represents a joint effort by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, California Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs (ADP), and ADPA. The Female Offenders Treatment Program (FOTP) was first implemented during the 1992-93 Fiscal Year.

FOTP provides community residential alcohol and drug treatment and recovery services to women parolees in four counties – Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, and San Bernardino. The program is administered jointly by ADP and the County Alcohol and Drug Services in each of the four counties. Primary referrals are female parolees graduated from the California Institute of Women (CIW) in-prison Forever Free Drug Program and women on community parole. Female inmates from the CIW in Frontera, who are paroled to Los Angeles County, voluntarily participate in community-based residential alcohol and drug treatment/recovery for up to six months.

The program objectives are:

- Provide up to six months of residential drug treatment services to each parolee who has graduated from the CIW in-prison Forever Free Drug Program and women on community parole.
- Improve female parolee outcomes evidenced by fewer drug-related revocations and related criminal violations.
- Reduce State General Fund costs for incarceration and parole supervision.

Female Offender Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.16 shows that the number of admissions fluctuated over the five fiscal years, ranging from a low of 86 in 2001-02 to a high of 111 in 2004-05. The number of participants followed a similar pattern of increases and decreases.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 98 participants accounted for 106 admissions; 8 (8.2%) of these participants had two or more admissions.



Table 3.19 shows that cocaine/crack remained the most prominent primary drug problem for female offenders during the five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). In 2001-02, 7 out of 10 female offenders reported cocaine/crack use compared to 4 out of 10 in 2005-06. During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, methamphetamine was the second most frequently reported drug problem. Methamphetamine use increased from 4.9% in 2001-02 to 33.7% in 2005-06. Heroin as a primary drug problem has declined (20.7% to 11.2%) over the five-year period.

General Relief Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Introduction

Existing State law (California Welfare and Institutions Code section 17000 et.seq) requires counties to maintain a general assistance program for indigent persons. Indigent persons are defined as adults, 18 years of age and older, who have no source of income or means of providing for their basic needs such as food, shelter, and clothing. In Los Angeles County, this program is known as General Relief.

Effective November 1997, all adult applicants applying for General Relief are required, as a condition for eligibility, to be screened during their intake interview to determine if there is a reasonable suspicion that he or she may have a substance abuse problem. These individuals are referred to an ADPA-contracted Community Assessment Services Center (CASC) for a professional evaluation, and, if appropriate, for urinalysis screening. Participants assessed and identified with alcohol or other drug problems are required to participate in a substance abuse treatment/recovery program in order to continue to receive General Relief benefits.


General Relief Admissions and Participants Trends

As seen in Table 3.21, from the first to the second fiscal year (2001-02 to 2002-03) admissions declined by 20.1%, spiked 56.8% in the third fiscal year (2003-04) and then dropped by 29.7% over the two remaining fiscal years (2004-05 to 2005-06). The number of participants has varied over the last five fiscal years, ranging from 3,417 to 5,260. Over the five fiscal years, admissions decreased by 12.0% and participants by 13.4%.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 3,637 participants accounted for 3,921 admissions; 250 (6.9%) of these participants had two or more admissions.



Table 3.23 shows the demographics for general relief participants over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). The majority of participants were male (63.2% to 71.3%), between 25 and 44 years of age (58.3% to 63.0%), completed 9 to 12 years of education (77.4% to 80.9%), and unemployed (81.9% to 92.9%). General relief participants were mostly Hispanic/Latino (32.5% to 40.1%), Black/African-American (27.1% to 36.8%), or White (23.2% to 25.3%). From first to third fiscal year (2001-02 to 2003-04), 3 out of every 10 participants reported being homeless and 4 out of 10 were homeless over the remaining two fiscal years (2004-05 and 2005-06).

Table 3.24 shows the primary drug problem reported by general relief programs for a five-year period (2001-02 to 2005-06). In 2001-02, alcohol (33.6%), cocaine/crack (25.8%), and methamphetamine (15.0%) were the most frequently reported drug problems for general relief participants. In spite of the downward trend for alcohol use, it still remained the most frequently reported substance of abuse for the first four fiscal years (2001-02 to 2004-05). In 2005-06, methamphetamine became the number one drug problem for general relief participants. Over the five fiscal years, methamphetamine use has increased each fiscal year, from 15.0% in 2001-02 to 30.4% in 2005-06. For four out of five fiscal years, approximately 12% of general relief participants reported heroin as their primary drug problem. Cocaine/crack use has fallen from 25.8% in 2001-02 to 20.3% in 2005-06.

Homeless Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs


Introduction

A "homeless person" is defined as someone who is living on the street or in an emergency shelter, or who would be living on the street or in an emergency shelter without supportive housing assistance. According to an analysis of U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development numbers performed by USA Today (2005), California (195,637) reported the largest homeless population for any state and Los Angeles County (88,345) reported the largest homeless population for any county. In fact, if Los Angeles County's reported homeless population was reviewed against states, it would be ranked as the third largest reported homeless population behind the states of California and Florida.

A total of 49,950 homeless participants have been admitted to ADPA-funded alcohol and drug treatment programs over the last five fiscal years, 2001-02 to 2005-06. During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, homeless participants were served in 301 of 362 (83.2%) of the ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment programs. They received such services as crisis intervention, screening and assessment, treatment plans, individual and group counseling, and referrals.

The following salient points regarding homeless program participants are based on national and local statistical findings.

- Nationally, according to The Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS) Report
 (2006) prepared by the Office of Applied Studies, homeless participants comprised 13.0% of all
 admissions to public-funded substance abuse treatment facilities in 2004. Over each of the last
 five fiscal years, homeless participants in Los Angeles County comprised from 20.3% to 24.9% of
 all admissions to ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment admissions.
- The DASIS Report shows that nationally the majority (77.0%) of homeless admissions are to residential detoxification (56.0%) and residential services (21.0%). Similarly, in Los Angeles County the majority (72.7% to 76.8%) of homeless participants were admitted to either residential service or residential detoxification programs.
- Nationally and locally, homeless admissions to treatment were older than those who were not homeless. According to the DASIS Report, nationally the average age of the homeless alcohol and drug admissions was 39. In Los Angeles County, the average age for homeless program participants over the last five fiscal years was 37.9.
- Nationally, 78.0% of homeless participants were male, a larger proportion than the 64.8% of Los Angeles County homeless that were males.
- Nationally, alcohol was the primary substance of abuse for more than half (52.0%) of homeless program admissions. In Los Angeles County, cocaine/crack (30.8%) and alcohol (29.7%) were the most prominent primary drug problems during the 2001-02 Fiscal Year. By 2005-06, alcohol (19.0%) was the third most prominent drug problem following methamphetamine (30.7%) and cocaine/crack (28.8%).
- According to SAMHSA's Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), in 2004 females comprised 22.0% of the reported homeless admissions nationally. Around the same time period in Los Angeles County, females comprised 35.2% of the homeless participants admitted to ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug programs. The percent of female participants who were homeless in Los Angeles County was 13.2% higher than what was reported nationally. Note that in Los Angeles County over each of the last five fiscal years, 34.4% to 37.5% of the homeless program participants were female.



Homeless Admissions and Participant Trends

Over the five fiscal years, the number of homeless program participants increased by 10.8%. Program admissions gradually increased from the first to the fourth fiscal year (2001-02 to 2004-05) and then slightly decreased in the fifth fiscal year (2005-06). [Table 3.26]

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 10,509 participants accounted for 11,882 admissions to alcohol and drug treatment programs; 1,187 (11.3%) of these participants had two or more admissions.



According to Table 3.28, over the last five years, most of the homeless participants were male (62.5% to 65.6%), between 25 and 44 years of age (59.8% to 66.8%), unemployed (80.5% to 97.6%), and most were White (32.1% to 35.0%), Black/African American (30.8% to 36.8%), or Hispanic/Latino (23.7% to 28.3%). The percent of homeless with mental health concerns has increased slightly over the five fiscal years, from 15.0% in 2001-02 to 23.3% in 2003-04.

Homeless Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

In the 2001-02 Fiscal Year, cocaine/crack (30.8%), alcohol (29.7%), and heroin (17.1%) use were the most prominently reported primary drug problems by homeless program participants (Table 3.29). Four fiscal years later, in 2005-06, methamphetamine (30.7%), cocaine/crack (28.8%), and alcohol (19.0%) use were the most prominent primary drug problems reported by homeless alcohol and drug program participants. The prominence of methamphetamine use has grown annually from 15.8% in 2001-02 to 30.7% in 2005-06. Over the five fiscal years, homeless participants reporting heroin use remained relatively constant, ranging from 17.1% in 2001-02 to 13.2% in 2005-06.



Introduction


Needle users carry an increased risk of blood-borne infections, including HIV/AIDS and Hepatitis C, through the sharing of syringes and other injection paraphernalia. Based on a 2003 Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS) Report by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Office of Applied Studies, there were 237,000 admissions reported to the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS) for which the primary drug of abuse was injected (13.0% of all admissions).

Salient findings from national and local sources on needle user program admissions and participants are as follows:

- These 237,000 admissions represent 11.1% of all public-funded substance abuse treatment facilities nationwide. Over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), Los Angeles County needle user program admissions comprised from 16.3% to 28.1% of all admissions to ADPA-funded alcohol and drug treatment programs.
- Heroin and other opiates accounted for 77.0% of all national admissions involving injection drug use. The other most commonly reported injected drugs were stimulants (16.0%) and cocaine (6.0%). Similarly, in Los Angeles County alcohol and drug programs reported heroin as the primary problem for 72.7% (five-year average) of needle user program participants. The proportion of local methamphetamine use among these participants has almost doubled (11.0% to 19.6%) over five fiscal years.
- National admissions involving injection drug users (IDU) were predominantly among Whites (64.9%), followed by Hispanics/Latinos (18.6%) and Blacks/African Americans (12.2%). During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, similar patterns may be discerned in Los Angeles County IDU admissions although the racial/ethnic breakdown differs: White (41.1%), Hispanic/Latino (37.4%), and Black/African American (12.5%).

Needle User Program Admissions and Participant Trends

Table 3.31 shows that the program admissions for needle users have decreased by 27.5% over the five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). From the second to the third fiscal year (2002-03 to 2003-04), there was a sharp increase of 36.3%, then a continued downward trend over the two remaining fiscal years (2004-05 to 2005-06), 24.8% and 23.3% respectively. The number of program participants followed a similar pattern as admissions, decreasing by 24.7% over the five-year period.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 7,088 participants accounted for 9,134 admissions; 1,432 (20.2%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

Needle User Program Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.32 describes the patterns of utilization of alcohol and drug program services by needle users during five fiscal years. About 20.0% of needle users each fiscal year were admitted to residential detoxification programs. In 2005-06 Fiscal Year, more than a quarter (2,395) of total needle user admissions were to residential services. From the third to fourth fiscal year (2003-04 to 2004-05), the number of NTP detoxification admissions decreased by 72.0%, followed by another large drop of 50.5% in the fifth fiscal year (2005-06). NTP maintenance admissions fluctuated during the five-year period, ranging from a low of 13.1% in 2002-03 to a high of 26.6% in 2004-05. Admissions to outpatient counseling programs remained relatively constant (16.1% to 22.3%) over the five fiscal years.

Needle User Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

For five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), heroin was the primary drug problem for the majority of needle users. Alcohol, cocaine/crack, marijuana/hashish, and other drug use remained marginal and stable throughout this period as the primary drug problem among needle users. Over the five fiscal years, the percent of needle users who reported methamphetamine as their primary drug increased from 11.0% to 19.6%.

Perinatal Services Network Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Introduction

The Office of Perinatal Substance Abuse oversees a statewide network of approximately 300 public-funded perinatal alcohol and other drug treatment programs that annually serve over 38,000 pregnant and parenting women, plus their children. In the Los Angeles County, during the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, ADPA contracted with 22 community-based agencies that provide 41 perinatal programs which served 1,240 women.

The Perinatal Services Network provides:


- Programs that empower women to achieve and maintain clean and sober living, deliver healthy infants, strengthen family units, and lead productive lives.
- Perinatal services are designed to be gender specific and culturally relevant.
- Treatment and recovery options include: long-term residential treatment, day care services, outpatient counseling, narcotic replacement therapy, case management services, transitional housing, and sobering living services.

In addition, perinatal treatment programs address the following women specific issues:

- cooperative child care
- ♦ transportation
- parenting skills building
- health education
- child development education
- linkages to medical, HIV/TB testing and counseling, education, and vocational services

Perinatal Admissions and Participants Trends

As seen in Table 3.36, from the first to the third fiscal year (2001-02 to 2003-04), the number of admissions to perinatal programs almost doubled (722 to 1,432). From the third to the fourth fiscal year (2003-04 to 2004-05), perinatal admissions declined 14.0% (1,231) and then increased by 7.7% (1,326) in 2005-06. The number of participants followed the same pattern as admissions, ranging a low of 648 in 2001-02 to a high of 1,327 in 2003-04.

Perinatal Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.37 shows that each fiscal year, the majority (58.2% to 79.7%) of perinatal services were provided in day care program facilities. Day care services are non-residential programs which provide counseling and rehabilitation services. These programs are more intensive than a visit and are available a minimum of six hours per day, six days per week. Program participants must attend scheduled, formalized services at least three hours per day, three times per week.

In 2001-02, 28.0% of perinatal participants received services from an outpatient counseling program. Four fiscal years later (2005-06), the percent of perinatal participants in an outpatient counseling program dropped to 12.6%. From the first to the third fiscal year (2001-02 to 2003-04), approximately 1 out of every 6 participant was admitted to residential services program. Over the two remaining fiscal years (2004-05 and 2005-06), the percentage for residential services declined to 12.7% and 7.5%, respectively. During the five-year period, only 1.3% (77 out of 5,970) of the perinatal participants were admitted to residential detoxification, narcotic treatment detoxification, or narcotic treatment maintenance programs.



Perinatal Program Participant Demographic Trends

As shown in Table 3.38, the demographics for perinatal participants remained relatively constant over five fiscal years. The majority of participants were between 25 and 44 years of age (67.6% to 80.9%), completed 9 to 12 years of education (74.1% to 81.5%), and unemployed (74.8% to 92.5%). Most perinatal participants were Hispanic/Latina (22.1% to 41.5%), Black/African American (31.1% to 47.1%), or White (19.9% to 26.9%). Perinatal participants who were homeless at admission increased from 12.5% in 2001-02 to 21.0% in 2005-06. Over the first four fiscal years (2001-02 to 2004-05), the percent of pregnant participants increased each year (from 12.2% to 19.4%). Then in 2005-06, the percentage of perinatal participants who were pregnant dropped to 11.5%.

Perinatal Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

According to Table 3.39, either cocaine/crack or methamphetamine was the most prominent primary drug problem reported by perinatal program participants each fiscal year. Cocaine/crack used has decline each of the five fiscal years, from 40.1% in 2001-02 to 21.7% in 2005-06. The prominence of methamphetamine use has increased from 30.2% in 2001-02 to 43.6% in 2005-06. Alcohol use continued to be a primary drug problem for 11.6% to 14.3% of the women in perinatal programs each fiscal year. Marijuana was similar to alcohol in reported use each fiscal year.

Pregnant Women Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Introduction

Substance use during pregnancy continues to be an ongoing concern because of the risks that illicit drugs, alcohol, and tobacco use pose to the mother, siblings, and unborn children.


The following are noteworthy findings based on comparisons between national and local statistics regarding pregnant women who participated in public-funded substance abuse programs.

Office of Applied Studies – The Drug and Alcohol Services Information System Report (September 3, 2006)

- During 2002, nationally, of the 363,000 women of childbearing age (15 to 44 years old) admitted
 to substance abuse treatment programs, 15,300 (4.0%) were pregnant. During the 2002-03
 Fiscal Year, in Los Angeles County, 919 (5.9%) of the 15,569 women program participants of
 childbearing age were pregnant at program admission.
- Nationally, most pregnant women entering treatment during 2002 reported cocaine/crack (22.0%), amphetamine/methamphetamine (21.0%), alcohol (18.0%), marijuana (17.0%), or heroin (15.0%) as their primary substance of abuse. Locally in Los Angeles County, during the 2002-03 Fiscal Year, most pregnant women reported methamphetamine (31.2%), cocaine/crack (27.1%), marijuana (14.5%), alcohol (14.3%), or heroin (8.4%) as their primary substance of abuse. The percentage of pregnant women reporting methamphetamine as their primary substance of abuse was considerably higher in Los Angeles County (31.2%) then nationally (21.0%). Locally, during the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, pregnant women reported methamphetamine (45.3%), marijuana (19.7%), cocaine/crack (15.7%), alcohol (11.6%) or heroin (5.3%) as their primary substance of abuse.
- Nationally, the majority (53.0%) of pregnant women entering treatment were between 20 and 29 years of age. In Los Angeles County, over each of the last five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), 39.5% to 55.2% of pregnant women were in this age range, 20 to 29 years of age.

National Survey on Drug Use and Health Report (January 2, 2004)

- Nationally, among pregnant women aged 15 to 44, approximately 6.0% Blacks, 4.0% Whites, and 2.0% Hispanics used illicit drugs in the past month. In Los Angeles County (2004-05 Fiscal Year), of the 585 pregnant women (15 to 44 years of age), who reported using illicit drugs in the past month, 27.5% were Blacks, 28.0% were Whites, and 39.0% were Hispanics.
- Nationally, 4.3% of pregnant women age 15 to 44 reported using an illicit drug during the past month. In Los Angeles County, over half (52.8%) of the pregnant women (15 to 44 years of age) at program admission reported they had used an illicit drug in the past month.
- Nationally, among pregnant women in the 15 to 44 age group, 9.8% reported drinking alcohol during the past month. In Los Angeles County, 12.0% of pregnant women at program admission reported drinking alcohol in the past month.



Pregnant Admissions and Participant Trends

Table 3.41 shows that from the first to the fourth fiscal year (2001-02 to 2004-05), the number of admissions and participants for pregnant women increased, 37.6% and 49.7%, respectively. Both admissions (7.7%) and participants (13.8%) declined from 2004-05 to 2005-06.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 947 participants accounted for 1,039 admissions; 81 (8.6%) of these participants had two or more admissions.



Pregnant Program Participant Demographic Trends

Table 3.43 shows the participant demographics for pregnant women over five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06). The majority of pregnant women completed 9 to 12 years of education (76.3% to 82.5%) and reported being unemployed (78.0% to 93.1%). For each fiscal year, approximately one-fourth of pregnant women were White. While the percent of Black/African Americans who were pregnant has deceased from 36.1% in 2001-02 to 25.9% in 2005-06, Hispanic/Latina pregnant women have increased (32.0% to 38.2%). For age, the majority of pregnant women were between 25 and 44 years of age (61.0% to 73.2%). The percent of pregnant women who reported being homeless, ranged from a low of 28.6% in 2005-06 to 35.1% in 2002-03.

Pregnant Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

The five-year primary drug trends show that methamphetamine use among pregnant women has steadily increased, 24.5% in 2001-02 to 47.2% in 2005-06. Since 2002-03 Fiscal Year, methamphetamine has been the most frequently reported primary drug problem for pregnant women. There has been a downward trend in pregnant women reporting cocaine/crack use over the five fiscal years. In 2001-02, 33.7% of pregnant women reported cocaine/crack use compared to 17.5% in 2005-06. Over the five-year period, there was a decline in the use of heroin by pregnant women (12.1% to 6.0%). From first to the third fiscal year (2001-02 to 2003-04), marijuana/hashish use remained fairly constant (9.8% to 10.3%). The number of pregnant women reporting marijuana/hashish use slightly increased over the two remaining fiscal years (2004-05 and 2005-06), 12.2% and 15.7%, respectively.

Prison Parolee Services Network Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Introduction

The Prison Parolee Network (PPN) is the result of a collaborative effort of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, California Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs, and ADPA. Male and female offenders, paroled to Los Angeles County, voluntarily participate in an ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment/recovery program for up to six months. Treatment includes residential, outpatient, and alcohol/drug-free living center services.

PPN's program objectives are:

- to place parolees in appropriate alcohol and other drug treatment and recovery programs either from the community parole systems or immediately upon release from prison custody;
- improve parole outcomes as evidenced by fewer drug-related revocations and related criminal violations, and to reintegrate parolees into society and encourage a clean and sober lifestyle; and
- reduce State General Fund costs for incarceration and parole supervision.

PPN Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.46 shows that the number of admissions gradually increased each fiscal year. Over the five fiscal years (2001-02 to 2005-06), admissions increased by 19.4% and participants increased by 22.6%.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 731 participants accounted for 799 admissions; 63 (8.6%) of these participants had two or more admissions.



As shown in Table 3.48, the majority of PPN participants were male (79.4% to 89.3%), between 25 and 44 years of age (70.2% to 75.3%), completed 9 to 12 years of education (80.2% to 86.5%), and unemployed (69.6% to 89.4%). According to Table 3.49, during the 2005-06, methamphetamine (34.7%) and cocaine/crack (28.3%) were the two most frequently reported primary drug problems for PPN participants. Methamphetamine use has grown each of five years from 16.8% in 2001-02 to 34.7% in 2005-06. On the other hand, cocaine/crack use has dropped each fiscal year (from 45.8% to 28.3%). 

Proposition 36 Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Introduction


The Substance Abuse and Crime Prevention Act (SACPA) of 2000, more commonly known as Proposition 36, amended existing drug sentencing laws to require that adult criminal defendants who are convicted of a non-violent drug offense, be placed in drug treatment as a condition of probation, instead of incarceration. The purpose was to enhance public safety by reducing drug-related crime and preserving jail and prison space for violent offenders. Drug treatment, in lieu of incarceration, is also required for State parolees convicted of non-violent drug offenses or who commit drug-related parole violations. Eligible offenders receive up to one year of drug treatment followed by six months of continuing care services. Vocational training, health, mental health, and other services were also provided. Proposition 36 allowed for dismissal of charges upon successful completion of treatment.

The successful implementation and ongoing operation of Proposition 36 in Los Angeles County was made possible because of the coordinated collaboration and constant communication among the Court, ADPA, District Attorney's Office, Probation Department, Public Defender's Office, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Community Assessment Services Centers, and community-based treatment providers.

Salient points on statewide and local Proposition 36 program admissions and participants follow:

- Altogether, more than 140,000 participants statewide entered treatment in the first four fiscal years (2001-02 to 2004-05) of Proposition 36 implementation. During the same time period, Los Angeles County had 36,108 Proposition 36 participants and 43,499 admissions.
- A 2006 review of the first four years of SACPA indicated that more than half of all statewide Proposition 36 participants report methamphetamine as their primary drug of abuse.
 Los Angeles County reported methamphetamine as the primary drug problem of 33.7% to 38.5% of Proposition 36 participants over four fiscal years. Cocaine/crack was reported by 30.0% to 34.5% of Los Angeles County participants.
- Nearly 48,000 participants throughout the State completed treatment (34.0%) during the four fiscal years. In Los Angeles County, positive treatment compliance ranged from 39.2% to 43.6%; they were successful in complying with their treatment plan. During the 2004-05 Fiscal Year, Proposition 36 participants in Los Angeles County had the highest completion rate (24.9%) for the four-year period.

Please note that the number of Proposition 36 participants and admissions reported in the Annual Review are slightly different than what appears in the 2004-05 Proposition 36 Annual Report. The variance between the two reports, approximately 800 cases, is attributable to reporting differences. The Proposition 36 Annual Report includes information received from ADPA-contracted and non-contracted programs. The Annual Review only includes information reported by ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs. However, even with these reporting differences, most of the statistical findings in both reports are the same or very similar.



Proposition 36 Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.51 shows the steady increase in the number of Proposition 36 program admissions and participants, beginning in 2002-03 Fiscal Year.

During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, 13,720 participants accounted for 17,252 admissions; 2,731 (19.9%) of these participants had two or more admissions

Proposition 36 Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

As shown in Table 3.54, in 2001-02 Fiscal Year, cocaine/crack (34.5%) and methamphetamine (33.7%) were the two most frequently reported primary drug problems for Proposition 36 participants. Since the 2002-03 Fiscal Year, methamphetamine has ranked as the number one drug problem. Alcohol (8.1% to 10.4%) and heroin (8.1% to 10.3%) use have remained relatively stable over the five fiscal years.

Chapter 4 – LAC Participant Statistics by Agency

Alcohol and Drug Program Administration (ADPA) contracted with community-based agencies to provide a comprehensive array of alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services to County residents with alcohol and/or other drug problems. During the 2005-06 Fiscal Year, ADPA contracted with 150 agencies that provided treatment/recovery services to 50,220 participants. Note a participant can receive treatment/recovery services from more than one agency during the fiscal year. Therefore, the number of participants shown in this chapter is greater than the number of participants shown in Chapter 1.

The vast majority of the contracted agencies provide alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services to both male and female participants. Of the 150 agencies, 14 served only female participants and 10 served only male participants. Chapter 5 – LAC Alcohol and Drug Statistical Fact Sheets

Chapter 5 is a selection of statistical "Fact Sheets" which provide information on key Los Angeles County alcohol and drug-related indicators and outcomes. Alcohol and drug-related indicators and outcomes are useful tools for monitoring substance abuse in the community. The primary source for this information was the Los Angeles County Participant Reporting System. Additional information was obtained from State and federal databases and national surveys. The following is a brief description of the indicators and outcomes reported in this chapter:

Individual and Public Health

Alcohol and drug-related death counts are based on medical information from death certificates describing a condition(s) exacerbated by alcohol or illicit drug use, being listed as the immediate, intervening, or underlying cause of death – plus additional information related to the cause of death.

Communicable disease diagnosis pertains to counts of reportable diseases that are directly or indirectly associated, in terms of susceptibility or risk, with alcohol and drug abuse or misuse. Specific indicators include a diagnosis of tuberculosis, sexually transmitted diseases, Hepatitis B, and HIV/AIDS. Also available are counts of Los Angeles County alcohol and drug treatment participants who were tested for HIV/AIDS and whose results were received.

Hospital and Health Services

Alcohol and drug-related hospital discharges represent inpatient discharge data for patients treated for alcohol and illicit drug abuse in Los Angeles County acute care hospitals reporting statistics to the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development.

Additional health service indicators include the number of days of physical health problems in the past 30 days, the number of hospital visit(s) for emergency services, and the number of days spent overnight in a hospital for health problems.

Mental Health

Mental health indicators included in this chapter pertain to alcohol and drug treatment program participants who have spent days in a hospital or psychiatric facility for psychiatric problem(s) in the past 30 days; the number of days prescribed medication(s) were taken, and the number of times outpatient emergency services were received for mental health needs.

• Criminal Justice

Alcohol-related arrests occur when persons are taken into custody because they are believed to have violated alcohol laws such as driving under the influence, public drunkenness, and liquor law infractions.

Drug-related arrests occur when persons are taken into custody because they are believed to have violated drug laws.

Other criminal justice indicators are the number of times the alcohol and drug treatment program participant has been arrested and the number of days the participant was in jail or in prison in the past 30 days.

Alcohol-Related Traffic Accidents

California Highway Patrol statistics show the number of Los Angeles County motor vehicle accidents, which involved the use of alcohol, specifically, fatal and injury accidents, and persons killed or injured as a result of these accidents.

• Treatment Utilization

This refers to all primary alcohol and drug admissions to County-contracted treatment programs.






